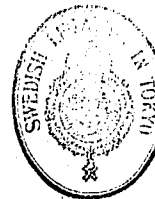

In the middle of February this year I started from Bombay on an official journey to Calcutta and Delhi. It was my intention on the return voyage from Delhi to Bombay to stop over in Deoli and visit the Japanese Civilian Internment Camp. Upon my arrival in Delhi I was, however, informed by the Government of India, Home Department, that a regrettable incident had happened in the Camp, and that it would be appreciated if I could go there at once.

I accordingly made a special trip from Delhi to Deoli and back staying in the Camp two days. In this connection, I have the honour to report as follows.

Before my departure from Deoli I was informed by the Home Department that in the latter part of last year it was realized by the authorities that a considerable number of the Japanese Internees did not believe in the reality of Japan's surrender. In order to give the internees a true understanding of the situation, the Government

of India arranged for the late Japanese Ambassador in London Sawada and for Lt. General Isoda to go to Deoli. These high officials visited the Camp on the 2nd December 1945. The Ambassador explained the events, confirmed the capitulation and read out His Majesty the Emperor's proclamation to the assembled internees. At first this made an impression but gradually many of the internees again began to profess their disbelief in the surrender, expressing suspicion about the identity of the Ambassador and the General. A state of tension arose between the two groups: those who accepted the reality of the surrender and those who did not.

In the night of February 19 - 20th, a number of persons belonging to the anti-surrender party assaulted members of the other party, as a result of which 16 of the latter had to be taken into hospital for treatment. The following nights assaults were continued and members of the surrender party terrorized. About 80 of the latter fled from the Wings and asked the Camp authorities to be given refuge elsewhere.

The Camp Commandant hereupon after consultation with the Home Department, decided to separate the two parties. This action was begun on the 24th of February. The separation was effected as to Wings No. 2 and 4 without disturbance. When proceedings were taken as to Wing No. 1 from where 70 persons should be removed the internees, however, made opposition and assaulted members of the Camp Staff. The Camp Commandant made serious remonstrations, explaining to the internees the necessity of keeping the peace and obeying orders given, but with little result.

The Commandant now called upon the assistance of a detachment of Infantry of the Indian army which arrived on the 25th of February.

The following day another attempt was made to separate the internees in Wing No. 1, the police guarding the Camp, and military being held in readiness. Members of the Camp Staff who went into the Wing were again assaulted and had to leave the Wing. Thereupon a crowd of men and women in Wing No. 1 began to throw stones and bricks at the police. Also men from Wing No. 2 began to break down the wire enclosure to get into Wing No. 1. A district magistrate who was present, read out the Riot Act but when the riot continued and there appeared to be a danger of the internees breaking out, fire was ordered. The military fired 67 rounds, 15 internees were killed and 16 seriously wounded and admitted to hospital. Immediately upon opening of the firing the riot ceased. The internees threw down their arms and missiles; order was at once given to cease firing. Those internees who were suspected of having committed assaults on the members of the surrender party, were taken into custody.

Upon my arrival in Deoli I saw the Camp Commandant, Lt. Colonel Craster. He explained that he was very sorry to have had to order the firing but he was responsible for the Camp, many of the internees were armed and there was a danger of them breaking out and spreading over the countryside.

I was later shown the collection of arms and missiles thrown away by internees as a result of the firing. There were home-made knives and other instruments, also a number of pieces of wood up to nearly one yard long and with sharpened points, which seemed to show that breaches of the peace had been premeditated.

On the 6th of March, in the presence of the Camp Commandant and his Staff, I had a meeting with the Japanese supervisors of the various Wings and their interpreters.

I put a series of questions to the supervisors. I obtained confirmation that the root of the incident was in fact that many of the internees had not been able to understand the reality of the capitulation of Japan and had gradually come into a state of extreme excitement. I had first to re-confirm my own identity and official position which, after a little hesitation, was acknowledged since I had visited the Camps several times before. I thereupon confirmed the identity of Ambassador Sawada and Lt. General Isoda. One of the internees, Mr. Eguchi, who had been living in London stated that he personally knew Ambassador Sawada. Upon this statement and my confirmation the representatives of the Wings now declared they believed in the authenticity of the visit of Ambassador Sawada and Lt. General Isoda. I thereupon confirmed the facts of the Japanese surrender, the Emperor's proclamation and the present military occupation of Japan.

I requested the Wing supervisors to return to their respective Wings, explain my statements to the internees and let me know if any of them still remain in doubt.

During the afternoon letters were received from the supervisors of the various Wings confirming that the internees had taken note of my explanation, that, they believed in them and now understood the position.

Since considerable tension remained in the Camp, and doubts might creep in again, the supervisors and also the Camp Commandant requested that a cable should be sent through the Royal Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs, Division B, asking for a confirmation directly from a Japanese Government Authority, about Japan's surrender and the

substantial content of His Majesty's proclamation, also confirmation that it was in fact Ambassador Sawada and General Isoda who visited Deoli in December last. The following day I visited the various Wings. There was naturally a considerable depression because of the casualties occasioned by the riot among the internees, but the internees behaved in a quiet way. I asked everywhere if there was still anyone who doubted my statements of the preceding day, but none came forward.

I learned that two of the wounded had died, thus bringing the total dead to 17, and that 12 were still under treatment in hospital, none of them are considered dangerously wounded. The hospital made a very clean, quiet, well arranged and well ordered impression.

The texts of the following documents are enclosed.

- 1) Summary notes of the proceedings of the Conference of the 6th of March.
- 2) Statement presented at the Conference by Wing No. 2.
- 3) " " " " by Wing No. 5.
- 4) - 6) Statements from Wings No. 1, 4 & 7 confirming that they have understood and believed in the explanations of the Consul-General.

It will be noted that the statement of Wing No. 2 contains the allegation that Dum-Dum bullets had been used by the military. As appears from the summary notes of the proceedings, I took up this matter at the meeting. It was conclusively shown by statements by the Commander of the troops and by the Medical Officer of the Camp that these allegations were incorrect and that no such bullets had been used. The allegations were thereupon formally withdrawn by the Supervisor of Wing 2.

Except for the questions arising out of the riot, there is very little to report from this visit.

The internees requested information about the continuance of their allowance. I replied that money was available for the time up to the end of March, and that a request would be sent to the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, Division B, for more money. I also said that I hoped it would be possible to pay allowance to the internees as long as they stayed in India, but no definite assurance could be given in this respect.

(Remark: Upon my return to Bombay, I find that a remittance has been received from Stockholm which will be sufficient to pay allowances up to the end of June 1946).

All the internees were naturally very concerned about the matter of repatriation. They asked for information as to the time when they could expect to be repatriated and also if they would all be sent to Japan or if those who had before the war been residing in Singapore and surrounding British territories would be allowed to return there. Upon my return to Delhi, I discussed this matter with several officials in the Home Department. They explained that the arranging of transportation for repatriation was within the competence of the SEAC Command. So far that command because of scarcity of tonnage had not been able to give any definite promise as to repatriation. A new communication had however, recently been directed to the SEAC Command. It appeared from my conversation that the Home Department would prefer to have the internees repatriated as soon as possible.

As to the question of return to Singapore and other British territories it was explained to me that that would depend on the

Colonial Governments of those territories. Each individual case would have to be examined by these Governments, which naturally would require time. No definite information could be given regarding to what extent return would be permitted.

NOTES ON THE PROCEEDINGS OF A CONFERENCE HELD IN THE CAMP HEAD-QUARTERS OFFICE AT 1030 HOURS ON THE 6TH MARCH, 1946.

Present.

1. M. Hallenborg, Consul General for Sweden.
2. Lt. Col. R.F. Craster, O.B.E., Commandant, Int. Camp.
3. Mr. F. C. Coventry I.P., Commandant, 5th. Bn. S.A.C., Deoli.
4. Major A.H.J. Dunlop, I.C., O.C. Detachment, Indian Grenadiers, Masirabad.
5. Major F. Church, M.B.E., Dy. Commandant, Int. Camp.
6. Dr. I.W. Adler, Adjutant, Int. Camp.
7. Major V.D. Bakshi, Japanese Interpreter.
8. Dr. E. J. Hall, A.M.O. Int. Camp.
9. Dr. H.F. Mahndel, M.O. Int. Camp.
10. Wing Commanders, Wings 1, 2, 4, 5 and 7.
11. Japanese internees - 3 representatives including interpreters from each Japanese wing.

Internees enter room and bow. One did not do so, the Commandant asked him to bow and he did.

Commandant ... Speaks as follows:-

Mons. Hallenborg, the Royal Swedish Consul General has arrived here to-day at the request of the Japanese internees in this Camp and with the concurrence of the Government of India - Had the Japanese not lost the war, which certain internees in this Camp still believe, the Japanese Government would have no doubt asked the Protecting Power to look into the recent disturbance in this Camp and the present situation. This, the Japanese Government has not done.

I hope and I am sure that all my staff, the Military Officers present and the Japanese internee-representatives present will co-operate with Mons. Hallenborg and give him every assistance in this conference this morning and answer truthfully any questions he may ask.

Consul General for Sweden ... Expresses his great regret for the disturbances that have occurred in this Camp. He wonders as to how it has happened and feels that every thing should be done to getting all right again.

Commandant ... Wings 2 & 5 have sent in written statements which will be read out by Major Church in English and translated to the Japanese internees in their language.

Have you all got paper and pencil to take down any thing you wish to?

Major Church ... Reads the statement made by Wing 2.

Commandant ... It may be brought on record that the petition was written by Wing 2 whilst the disturbance took place in Wing 1.

Major Church ... Reads the statement made by Wing 5.

Commandant ... Asks the interpreters to translate statements read in English to Japanese internees in Japanese language.

Commandant ... Informs that upto last night 26 internees have come forward and given their names, more names are expected to come, who took part in the disturbance and in beating internees and who are guilty. It gives satisfaction that my original order asking names of trouble makers is being carried out. The names will be checked with the lists I have in the office of suspected persons. This list was started in December last. An accurate check will be made in order that innocent internees are not made scape-goats and guilty ones escape.

C.G.S. ... Asks the internees to let him know the cause of assault on fellow internees on the night of 19/20th February, 1946.

Wing 1 ... The difference of opinion regarding surrender of Japan was the cause of the trouble.

Wing 4 ... As above.

Wing 5... As above.

Wing 7 ... As above.

The internees agreed that they started the trouble and brought trouble on themselves.

C.G.S. ... I come to the conclusion that the disturbance was the result of some internees not believing in Japan's capitulation.

Wing 2... Internees of Wing 7 do not believe that Japan has surrendered.

C.G.S. ... Asks representative of Wing 7, speaking English, if he does not believe in Japan's capitulation. His Majesty the Emperor of Japan's proclamation was read to them by Ambassador Sawada and Lt. General Isoda when they visited the Camp in December last.

Before Wing 7 representative replied, the C.G.S. again told the internees that Japan has lost the War. It is a fact. Japanese Army, Navy and Air Force have all capitulated and Japan has been occupied by Allies Armies (United States and British Troops).

Wing 7 ... States that they considered Ambassador Sawada and Lt. General Isoda were imposters.

C.G.S. ... Is there no one here who has met them before?

Wing 5 ... Eguchi says that he met Ambassador Sawada in London.

Wing 7 ... Eguchi is my friend and I now understand that Japan has lost the War.

C.G.S. ... Is there any one who does not believe that I am C.G.S.?

Wings 5,4,1,2, and 7 ... We all believe.

Wing 2 ... Asks if the C.G.S. was informed officially about the capitulation of Japan.

C.G.S. ... This appeared in News-papers.

C.G.S. ... Is there any one who does not believe the proclamation made by His Majesty the Emperor of Japan?

Wings 1,2,4,5 and 7 ... We believe now.

C.G.S. ... Asks the internees present that they will convince other internees about Japan's capitulation.

C.G.S.... (1) I will arrange that a telegram from Japanese Government is sent to internees to this effect but this will require some time.

(2) Punishment comes for bad people. His Majesty the Emperor of Japan does not like that his subjects go beating each other.

(3) General Mac Arthur gives orders what the Japanese Government should do. The Japanese Government has carried ~~these~~ orders peacefully and nicely.

(4) He asks the representatives to go to their wings and speak to other internees. If there are any internees who still do not believe in Japan's capitulation, he (C.G.S.) will speak to them.

Commandant ... I will not allow a mass meeting of all Japanese wings at the present juncture but I have no objection to a limited number of non-believers coming to Headquarters this afternoon at 1500 hours. Lists of those who wish to attend will be submitted to my office by 14.30 hours for my sanction.

Commandant ... Suggests that some well known Japanese newspapers be flown from Japan. I mean by this - papers of reputation and known to the Japanese themselves, such as "The Times" and "Daily Mail" which English people recognise.

C.G.S. ... Agrees with the Commandant's suggestion.

C.G.S. ... Is there any one who has any thing to say about the interference by the S.A.C. or the Military.

Commandant ... Reference para 3 of Wing 2 statement ...

Asks Major Dunlop and Dr. Mahndel to state if Dum Dum bullets were used.

Explains what a Dum Dum bullet is.

Major Dunlop ... No Dum Dum bullets were used. Dum Dum bullets are not issued to British or Indian Army. I am quite willing that any of my men may be called and the ammunition he has may be examined.

(He called a soldier from a distance and produced his pouch of ammunition)

Internees examined it for themselves.

They were not Dum Dum bullets.

Since the shooting range was 4-5 yards, this would cause large exit wound.

Dr. Mahndel ... States that the bullets he has extracted were not Dum Dum. The extensive wounds might be caused by short range shooting. 0054 1/2

Dr. Hall, A.M.C. ... Confirms the statement of Dr. Mahndel.

Wing 2 ... Withdraws the statement contained in their petition about the use of the Dum Dum bullets.

Wing 2 ... Asks what was the particular incident which lead to firing.

Commandant ... The incident was when the Civil Magistrate read the order. The Magistrate was stoned and disorder prevailed.

Major Dunlop ... The incident was when Wing 2 broke and rushed to Wing 1.

Commandant ... I confirm. Order was disobeyed. Internees were warned not to come within 15 yards of the troops. Japanese women used Lathies, knives, and other sharp weapons and threw stones against the S.A.C. and the troops and Camp staff.

C.G.S. ... Is there any further complaint against firing?

Wing 1 ... They did not hear the warning of 15 yards.

Commandant ... Major Walker (G.H.Q.) and Civil Magistrate read it. It may be that internees did not hear because there was a great up-roar noise, and shouting by internees.

Wing 2 ... They did not believe that the Commandant meant business.

Commandant ... I had made it quite clear to internees that force would be used if they did not behave orderly, and obey my orders. To see that discipline was observed and maintained was my job. To warn internees I attended roll call personally and explained to them my orders on 20th February, 1946.

Wings 4, 5 & 7 ... No complaints.

Major Dunlop ... I take objection to para 14 of Wing 2 statement. Internees broke out from Wing 2 to Wing 1. It was an offence.

Commandant ... Asks Wing 2 - Do you withdraw the statement?

Wing 2 ... Attempt to come out was not checked but internees were fired on.

C.G.S. ... The other points he understands are:-

- (1) Repatriation.
- (2) Allowances.

Regarding Allowances:- I have already received allowances for February and March. I assure you that I will ask for the continuance of this allowance but cannot promise. I do not know how much in Japanese funds is available in Sweden.

Commandant ... Refers to Wing 5 petition, para 3.

I agree that C.G.S. should ask for the continuance of the payment of the allowance.

I do not agree that allowance should not be paid or halved to internees segregated (To those who give this suggestion my reply is "mind your own business"). I know my powers and the punishments that I can award.

C.G.S. ... Regarding Repatriation. This is a matter in which I can not do any thing. SEAC and Government of India deal with the subject. Mr. Shankar told me that he could not give any definite date.

The return of internees to Malaya and Singapore etc. will be decided by the Government of India.

Commandant ... 8 out of 10 internees in Wing 4 assaulted were those who desired to return to British Occupied territories.

It is unfortunate for example for one woman whose British Husband died during the War in a Camp and left a large estate in Singapore for the woman to manage and settle there. People who have property and connections in the British Occupied territories, if not allowed to return, will be stranded in Japan. This merely is an example of those Japanese whom I think the Government of India and SEAC will allow to return to British Occupied territory.

C.G.S. ... Formosans may apply to return to Malaya or Formosa and Government of India will deal with their requests. It is bad for internees to interfere with each other in this respect. Each individual must choose for himself where he wants to go.

Commandant ... Refers to para 1 of Wing 2 petition.

In the last four years I have been extremely kind to you and only punished those internees who committed offences against Camp orders. I had to call the Military when the situation became out of control of Civil Administration. This is a Civil Camp and will remain so. If my orders are disobeyed, and disorder and disturbances occur again, the Military will be called in again.

Regarding Segregation:- Lists of each party may be sent to me and then I will decide the question of accommodation and segregation.

As already explained to you, relations were strained between the Fascists and Royalists in February 1944. The matter was settled peacefully when they furnished lists of parties and groups and their leanings etc.

I am quite willing to do this for the Japanese. Tented Camp is not suitable for summer and I do not wish that any

party should be forced to live there unless all available accommodation in the Hutted Camp has been fully occupied.

C.G.S. ... Any thing more?

Wing 2 ... Will those who crossed from Wing 2 to Wing 1 be punished by you (Commandant) or by higher authority?

Commandant ... They will be punished by me. I repeat here that it is a British Law that no one is punished twice for the same offence.

Sir,

On behalf of the Internees of this Wing I beg to thank you for coming to see us at so short notice.

In connection with the recent disturbances, we feel that our attitude had been wrong. We feel that we misunderstood or failed to appreciate the situation more fully and behaved recklessly.

Next we beg to bring to your notice our thoughts and feelings which we hope you would kindly consider in the light of events which preceded your arrival here.

- 1.) As civil internees we feel that the Soldier Commandant's hand is too strong for us.
- 2.) We have been told that the recent shooting by armed troops was the last resort to restore order in the Camp but we believe that there could have been other alternatives.
- 3.) According to those who saw the wounded and the dead on the morning of February 26, the gun-shot wounds showed that Dum-Dum bullets were used in addition to the ordinary service rifle cartridge. We ask, was the use of Dum-Dum bullets justified.
- 4.) This Wing made no requests for certain Internees to be segregated from the rest of us because of their political beliefs before the disturbances occurred. And, in this connection we have received no order from the Commandant.
- 5.) We beg to submit that the recent disturbances were the direct results of Newspaper and News reel propaganda in the Wing. With News of the Japanese surrender coming almost daily through the papers the newsreels and through individuals who cared little for the feelings of others the temper of the Internees in the Wing was on a keen edge. This talk of Japanese Surrender culminated in the assaults.
- 6.) As far as Wing II is concerned a single case of assault took place on the night of February 19. The assaulted Internee was given all aid possible and rushed to hospital.
- 7.) Internee Yamanaka Chusi who was assaulted in Wing II on Feb. 20. at about 2.30 A.M. was a transferee from Wing No. 4. We believe he was transferred to this Wing as he was threatened to be beaten up.
- 8.) I understand that the assault was to cure the victim of his defeatist ideas and there was no intention whatever of having the surrender party segregated.
- 9.) As supervisor of this Wing it is my considered opinion that were this question of separation from the main Wing was considered before the outbreak of the incident only a handful and that some Formosans only would have willingly undergone segregation.
- 10.) We submit that on the night of the assault on Yamanaka there would have been others who would have been beaten up.

This showed that although the feelings of the people were against the Surrender Party there was no cause whatever for them to fear any assault from Internees of their Wing. And, since the outbreak of the incident that night (19.2.46) a certain person went about the Wing calling out a string of names of the same time saying that those on the list were considered to belong to the Surrender Party and marked down for assault.

It subsequently came out that the list named by this particular individual was of his own compilation and a move calculated to gain followers behind him. This same Internee was the first to crawl out of the Wing and he even pulled those who had nothing to do with the Surrender Party to get out with him on the threat of pending assaults.

With this man going about the Wing threatening others with probable assaults Internees with families were chicken hearted also seeking refuge through fear of their wives and children being beaten up.

11.) On the morning of February 25, at roll call, the Then Supervisor read out punishments in addition to those already in force. At this time there was resentment in the Wing against the orders regarding punishments. While we were listening to the Supervisor agitators from across the ~~XXXX~~ Wire shouted across thus the trouble spread to Wing II.

The Supervisor threw up his job and at the same time five men were taken out by the Wing Commander. The Supervisor also went with them. In this connection the Commandant said that those five men taken away were to be held for questioning. And although we understood, we were not satisfied.

That night at about 10.000 P.M. masked men were going about the Wing it is alleged looking out for members of the Surrender Party. No one identified them as the night was moonless and very dark. Besides they were covered from head to foot.

12.) On February 26, at about 7.30 A.M. Armed troops and sentries with lathies were seen entering Wing No.1 contrary to what we understand a time limit requested by Mr. Coventry who tried to settle the trouble. At this time Internees from this Wing assembled near the Wing gate. When a trooper sounded a bugle call and troops and sentries were withdrawn we thought everything was alright but contrary to our thoughts troops armed with rifles and machine guns entered Wing 1 from the direction of the Hospital. This party included members of the S.A.C. armed with sticks.

When the Wing gates between Wings 1 & II were knocked open by Internees and while some men and women were going across from Wing II to Wing 1 to help their compatriots the firing started. As a result one old woman succumbed to injuries one seriously injured and 11 men were rounded up in Wing 1 after the situation had calmed down.

13.) We heard the Commandant would resort to force of arms to quieten down Wing 1 but we did not believe Internees would be killed. This was our mistake. If we had known for certain that this was not a bluff and that the Commandant meant business we believe this terrible mess would not have occurred.

14.) We submit that while the Wing Gates were being knocked open by Internees they did not prevent them doing so but deliberately lured them into Wing 1 and opened fire.

The above we submit is the gist of the cause and result of the disturbances which occurred in this Camp up till now.

Recent disturbances in the Internment Camp at Deoli.

I have the honour to state in connection with the above, that a telegram from the Commandant of the Camp was received by my predecessor on the 25th February 1946, intimating that the situation in Japanese wing was very strained that he had asked Nasirabad for troops and that the Sub-Divisional Officer, Kekri, had already arrived from Kekri at his request. The Sub-Divisional Officer, Kekri was thus already on the spot before my predecessor was informed of the affair.

2. A second telegram was received by my predecessor on the 26th February, asking him to visit Deoli for inquiry as a certain number of casualties had occurred. He regretted his inability to visit Deoli and ordered the Sub-Divisional Officer, Kekri to carry out the inquiries. Later on, on receipt of Sub-Divisional Officer's report the same night, Mr. Pridmore directed Khan Bahadur, A. Qayyum Khan to proceed the following morning to Deoli and to make the inquiries, as it appeared to him from the Sub-Divisional Officer's report that he (Sub-Divisional Officer) had himself ordered the firing. Next morning i.e. on the 27th, Mr. Pridmore after consultation with the Government Pleader wired to the Khan Bahadur that he should make an inquiry under Sec.176 Cr.P.Code. It appeared subsequently that the Sub-Divisional Officer, Kekri had not ordered the firing, and that there were 17 fatal cases on whom an inquest was held by the Sub-Divisional Officer Kekri before the arrival of the Khan Bahadur at Deoli. The inquest report is enclosed herewith in original. I also enclose a copy of the report sent by the Khan Bahadur which gives all the details.

3. The position of this Administration and the Sub-Divisional Magistrate, Kekri in whose jurisdiction Deoli lies, vis-a-vis affairs in the Internment Camp, Deoli, is not quite clear. It is therefore suggested that this may kindly be defined by a reference to the Home Department of the Government of India, if necessary, in case such a contingency arises again and whether the Sub-Divisional Magistrate, Kekri, should take part in matter inside the Camp.

As directed I proceeded to Deoli on the 27th morning. On my way to Deoli I had picked up the Sub-Divisional Officer at Kekri. Just when I had started inquiry, I received your telegram directing me to hold inquiry under 176 Criminal Procedure if there were any fatal casualties. 17 fatal casualties were caused and the dead bodies were

cremated

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cremated before my arrival at Deoli. An inquest under section 176 had already been held by the Sub-Divisional Officer, Kekri on 26th February 1946 (Vide flag 'A'1. Thus nothing was left to be done, but the Sub-Divisional Officer's inquest report simply said that deaths were caused by shots fired by the Military Officers of Nasirabad, it did not reveal as to when and where and how these shots were fired. Under these circumstances it was considered necessary to supplement it by further enquiries. 16 witnesses have been examined by me.

2. It appears that the trouble in the camp has been brewing for some time past. There had been two parties in the Camp, called the 'Surrender Party' and 'Non-surrender party'. The 'Surrender Party' consisted of those who believed in the defeat and surrender of Japan and the 'Non-surrender party' consisted of those who did not believe in the defeat and surrender of Japan. Tension amongst the Internees increased from the time when two Japanese Officers came to Deoli on the request of the internees and spoke to them. On the night intervening between the 19th and 20th February, a number of 'Surrender' internees were beaten by 'Non-surrender' party internees, and several of them had to be admitted in the Hospital. The guilty internees did not come forward though they were asked to do so. The trouble continued and more internees had to be admitted to the Hospital during the following days, some because they were beaten and others because they were threatened. On 24th February Dr. L.W. Adler, Adjutant, Internment Camp, Deoli went to Wing No. 1 to ask a certain number of the internees of this wing to come out, He was accompanied by Major Church, the Deputy Commandant of the Camp, and other members of the camp staff. The internees took riotous attitude and chased the Adjutant and his party out and one female internee hit the Adjutant on the head with some hard thing which she carried in her bag. The Adjutant received injuries and there was bleeding. He was attended at the Hospital. There was trouble again on the night of the 24th as some more 'Surrender Party' internees were beaten.

3. On the 25th morning the Wing staff of wing nos. 1 and 2 reported that they were unable to hold a roll call due to the threatening attitude of the internees. This morning (25th morning) Mr. Coventry, Commandant, S.A.C. accompanied by Major G.B. Walker (attached to G.S. Branch, G.S.I. (n) of G.H.Q.) went to Wing No. 1, and spoke to the leaders who had refused to come to the Commandant's office. Several hundreds (Japanese) collected in front of these officers. Major Walker tried to explain to them that they must release about 70 men as per list already handed over to them for interrogation purposes. But they flatly refused. Thereupon Major Walker declared that if they refused to obey the orders, force will be used to get them out of the Wing. They also abused Major Walker, Realising the seriousness of the situation Lt. Col. Craster, Commandant, Internment Camp, Deoli, sent telegrams to the Military at Nasirabad and Mhow and to the S.D.O. Kekri the same day (i.e. 25th Feb. As a result of these telegrams the S.D.O. Kekri reached Deoli at about noon and the Nasirabad Military, at about 16 hrs. A conference was held between the Military, the Civil

authorities

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authorities of the Internment camp and the S.D.O., Kekri. The whole situation was discussed there. It was decided to have negotiations with the Japanese on the morning of the 26th, February, 1946. The Military were explained that the task was to remove the male internees from the Wing No. 1, so that the Civil authorities could pick out certain persons that they wanted. The Officer in charge Military explained to his men what course was to be adopted by them in case of emergency, and that they were to use only the minimum force required.

4. On the morning of the 26th February 1946, a final attempt was made to remove the necessary internees by asking them to come out. Major Walker accompanied by Mr. Duncan and escorted by a number of Police men and some troops entered Wing No. 1. He wanted to speak to the main leader of the Japanese who rushed up to him (Major Walker) with stick, remonstrated against the entry of the troops and demanded their withdrawal. Major Walker explained to him the object of his entry. But the rioters refused to listen to him and some one sounded the alarm, as a result of which a great number of people including some women came out of the barracks. All of them were armed with pointed sticks, knives, etc., and advanced towards Major Walker and his party, shouting threats of killing them or beating them. With great difficulty Major Walker and his party were eventually able to leave the Wing from the Gate (Gate No. 1) by which they had entered. While Major Walker's party was at some distance from the gate he was attacked by 3 or 4 Japanese armed with sticks, and had it not been for the timely help he received from his companion Mr. Duncan who pulled him back, he would most certainly have been hit on the head by one of the internees. The Commandant at this stage was of the opinion that unless and until firing was opened, on the internees they would not surrender. The Commandant who had taken his seat on the roof of one of the buildings asked the Sub-Divisional Officer, Kekri, to explain the internees by going in the Wing. The Sub-Divisional Officer, Kekri realising the graveness of the situation and seeing that it was uncontrollable, himself went out and after notifying the internees who he was, asked them through Major Walker, the Japanese Interpreter that they should deliver about 70 men as per list already handed to them, peacefully for the sake of peace and good order and that if this was refused, the civil authorities will be compelled to hand the matter over to the Military at once. But the mob did not listen to what Major Walker interpreted. They defied the Magistrate's orders and threw stones on the police and the Sub-Divisional Officer himself. Major A.H.J. Dunlop, Commanding, Dett. Indian Grenadiers, Nasirabad, was also hurt on the head. One of the stones hurt the S.D.O. on the leg. The Magistrate then read out his declaration (Vide flag B) and asked for Military assistance as the situation was beyond control of Civil Power. The Military were required to (a) assist in restoring order, (b) to assist in enforcing obedience of the Commandant's orders, and (c) to remove by force, if necessary, all males from Wing No. 1. Internees who were armed with home made weapons, knives etc. had also to be disarmed. As the internees did not disperse after the riot act had been read over to them, Major Dunlop who had placed his platoons at different points, ordered his platoon from the power house area to proceed according to the plan which was chalked out by him in case the Military assistance was

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necessary

A:1-00-2-27-14-2

necessary. In the meanwhile a mob of about 70 to 80 armed internees from Wing No. 2 succeeded in breaking the gates between the Wing No. 1 and Wing No. 2 and broke into Wing No. 1. The internees in these two wings numbered over 1200. 5 rounds were fired and they withdrew. About half a minute later fire was opened by other platoons also as the internees were about to come to grips with the Military there.

5. In all 64 rounds appear to have been fired. The Military advanced southwards, clearing out the buildings. The Internees were driven back without any further firing towards gate No. 1 where they were dis-armed. Their arms were collected and they were passed out of the Wing by the troops and the Police, and marched to the Camp Office under escort and framed up there. Parties of internees and troops were detailed to collect casualties and carry them to the Medical inspection room. The total number of fatal casualties was 17 and the number of injured was 14.
