1. It is directed that the Japanese Government be notified that the troops of the 43rd Infantry Division will commence moving into the SAITAMA Prefecture on 13 September 1945.

2. Arrangements for billeting will be made on a temporary basis and will be made with local officials. Insofar as possible vacant and abandoned property will be utilized.

3. At the present time reconnaissance parties are within the area and when their report is submitted to this headquarters a formal demand will be made for permanent billets and necessary installations for the 43rd Infantry Division within the SAITAMA Prefecture.

MEMORANDUM NO. 25:

TO: Mr. Hattori, Yokohama Liaison Office, Prefectural Building.

It is desired that the following facilities be made available to the occupation forces:

1. Postal Life Insurance Building and Annexes, Mitokoyama Street, Tokyo for use as a military hospital by Surgeon 8th Army. Japanese civilians now occupy building.
2. Zengyoren Building, 36 Akashi Cho, Tokyo (across street from St. Luke's Hospital), for use as a military hospital by surgeon 8th Army. Building is now vacant.
3. Akashi Primary School Building, Akashi Cho, Tokyo (adjacent to St. Luke's Hospital), for use as a military hospital by surgeon 8th Army. Building is now vacant.
4. St. Luke's Hospital, Akashi Cho, Tokyo, (to include all annexes), to be used as a military hospital by Surgeon 8th Army. Dr. Hashimoto is the Hospital Director.
5. Japanese Seaman's Association Building, 51 Akashi Cho, Tokyo, (near St. Luke's Hospital) to be used as a military hospital by Surgeon 8th Army. Building now occupied by Japanese.
6. Area and buildings on east side of Timber Basin and area down to but not including the Estah Board Co., on the Kanagawa St. areas of buildings. Area required for billets for two battalions of 542nd SB & SR. (See Map 1 for location of area).

a This Headquarters has established a Military Government Staff

a. All schools be closed.

d. That Japanese regulations restricting

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sale of narcotics remain in force
e That all civilians turn in all arms
and ammunition to nearest
police station.

f. That all theatres be closed.

g. Individuals will remain with
in their respective places of abode

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from 1900 to 0600 daily unless
authorized by written permit by
this Headquarters.

h. That not more than ten (10) indi-
vidually will assemble a public
place at any time.

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In general, it is proposed to keep
in office Japanese civilian officials
who demonstrate a cooperative attitude
and willingness comply with the
orders of this Headquarters, representing
the United States Government.

In general, it is proposed to keep in office Japanese civilian officials who demonstrate a cooperative attitude and willingness to comply with the orders of this Headquarters, representing the United States Government.

Memorandum

According to a report from Baron Yasushi Hayashi, Director of the Local Liaison Office at Tateyama, Chiba Prefecture, Brigadier General Julian W. Cunningham, who landed there on September 3, handed the former an order as attached hereto and demanded its prompt execution. The report is causing serious anxiety and uneasiness.

The Japanese Government is constrained to point out that such an order contradicts the general principle of the General Headquarters of the Allied Forces that the functions of the Japanese Government, including police function, will be maintained and respected and that the closing of schools is an unbearable step from the viewpoint of education and progress of the people.

It is earnestly requested that the General Headquarters will pay serious consideration in this regard and issue suitable instructions to the Commander of the United States Army at Tateyama.

Initial Reconnaissance of Eastern Sector, CHIBA Peninsula.

1. This Headquarters has been authorized to initiate reconnaissance in the Eastern Sector, Chiba Peninsula (see overlay) in view of executing occupational plans when ordered.

Composition of Reconnaissance Party:

Major Joseph R. Dean
Major Harmon Boland and one officer
One officer from 148th FA Bn
Interpreter
Necessary enlisted personnel

Duration: Party will depart 19 September and return not later than 22 September.

2. The mission of the reconnaissance is:

a. Location of suitable sites for future troop occupation; attention will be given to MOHARA, TOGANE, KATAKAI, YACHIMATA, OHARA, TSURUMAI and TANNOO. All possible sites will be investigated for:

- (1) Suitable troop quarters or tent camp areas.
- (2) Feasibility of establishing enemy equipment dumps.
- (3) Cub landing strip.

b. Contact the responsible Japanese Army and Navy Commanders of the sector (see overlay for CP locations) and direct that the following report be delivered to 112th RCT Headquarters, TATEYAMA, by 24 September 1945:

- (1) Location of all military, Army or Navy, installations within our sector.
- (2) Armament, garrison, munitions and supplies of all kinds at such installations (inventory list)
- (3) Supply dumps, including strategic stock piles of war material.

- (4) Location, description and inventory of Chemical Warfare supplies.
 - (5) Status of artillery, AA and coastal defense weapons - are they inoperative and if so, by what manner have they been made inoperative?
 - (6) Status of military communication facilities.
- c. Advise the responsible Japanese Army and Navy commanders to be prepared to:
- (1) Furnish guides to all installations.
 - (2) Assemble in dumps to be established by this Headquarters, utilizing Japanese vehicles and personnel, the following, in order listed:
 - (a) Breach blocks of all artillery AA and coastal defense guns.
 - (b) Fire control instruments.
 - (c) Small arms, including rifles, bayonets, pistols, machine guns, flame throwers.
 - (d) Ammunition of all types which can be handled manhandled. Priority will be hand grenades, small arms and artillery.
 - (e) Petroleum products.
 - (f) Other supplies as called for by this Headquarters.

SUBJECT: Buildings and Facilities in Tokyo Area Required
by Allied Occupation Forces.
TO : Central Liaison Committee, Japanese Imperial
Government.

1. The buildings and installations indicated below, as selected by representatives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, will be required initially in the Tokyo area for use of Allied occupation forces.

2. It is desired to commence reconnaissance and inspection of buildings and installations by representatives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, to determine their suitability without delay. To assist in this inspection it is desired that 30 officers and guides familiar with locations and types of buildings and installations indicated, with necessary motor transportation, be available on call to accompany representatives, commencing 4 September 1945.

3. The type of facilities and estimated capacity or areas follow:

a. Quarters:

(1) General Officers:

Suitable hotel or apartment accommodations, with appropriate appointments and furnishings, for not less than 150 General Officers.

(2)

(2) Officers:

Hotel accommodations or equivalent for not less than 5,250 officers, of which 350 will be female officers.

(3) Enlisted Men:

Barracks or equivalent for not less than 22,000 (allowance of 500 cubic feet per man). The above requirement includes 1,250 enlisted women.

b. Hospitals:

Total capacity of 9,000 beds. (Allowance of 100 square feet floor space per bed.)

c. Office Space:

1,025,000 square feet, complete with office furniture and equipment.

BASIC: Ltr SCAP to Central Liaison Committee, Japanese Imperial Government, file AG 600 (3 Sep 45)GD, dtd 3 Sep 45, subj "Buildings and Facilities in Tokyo Area Required by Allied Occupation Forces."

d. Storage:

(1) Covered storage: 715,000 square feet.

(2) Open storage: 1,500,000 square feet.

e. Parking Area: 470,000 square feet, hard surface.

f. Shop Buildings: 50,000 square feet.

g. Refrigerated Storage: 21,000 cubic feet.

4. At the time of transfer to Allied occupation forces, all buildings and installations listed above will be clean, sanitary, equipped for their designed purpose, staffed with

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operating and service personnel, and ready for full operation,
and, where specifically stated, equipped with furnishings as
indicated.
