The Ship for Southeast Asian and Japanese Youth Program (SSEAYP) is a joint project between Japan and ASEAN member countries, launched in 1974. The program is carried out by the government of Japan with the active participation and cooperation of ASEAN member countries.

Brunei Darussalam joined in 1985, Socialist Republic of Vietnam in 1996, Lao People's **Democratic Republic** and Republic of the **Union of Myanmar in** 1998, and Kingdom of Cambodia in 2000. following their respective admission to ASEAN.

The **Democratic** Republic of **Timor-Leste** joined as observer in 2024 Timor-Leste (observer participation)




PURPOSE



1	Quality Education	1.8~1.16	PYs will understand the status and issues of education in ASEAN member countries and Japan. On that basis, PYs will discuss how youth can contribute to ensuring inclusive and quality education and lifelong learning for all.		
2	Economic Growth and Sustainable & Responsible Tourism	1.7 2.1	PYs will discuss how youth can contribute to developing economic growth while achieving sustainable society that maintains the livelihood for current generations and allows future generations to continue to live safely on the planet. PYs will understand the status and issues of tourism in ASEAN member countries and Japan and discuss how youth can contribute to the realization of sustainable and responsible tourism where both tourists and tourist spots give positive effects each other and its negative impact on the economies, cultures, communities, and environments of the places being visited can be mitigated.		
3	Global Environment and Climate Change	2.4 2.6	PYs will recognize the current environmental situation and acknowledge the issues of climate change and biodiversity in ASEAN member countries and Japan. On that basis, PYs will discuss how youth can contribute to balancing developments, urbanization and the establishment of sustainable society.		
4	Disaster Risk Reduction and Recovery	2.7	PYs will discuss how youth can contribute and maximize the achievement of disaster risk reduction and post-disaster recovery in the fields of politics, society, education and others. Subsequently, PYs will discuss current disaster situation from different perspectives and recognize the challenges and opportunities held among ASEAN member countries and Japan.		
5	Social Welfare and Inclusion	2.12	PYs will understand the status and issues of social welfare systems in ASEAN countries and Japan. On that basis, PYs will discuss how youth can contribute to the realization of an inclusive and diverse society where equal opportunities are guaranteed to all, including the elderly, people with disabilities and children, can have a role, support each other, and have equal opportunities to live their own lives with peace of mind.		
6	Digital Society and Al	2.9	PYs will understand the best practices from around the world where digital technology is used, and the current situation and issues in ASEAN member countries and Japan. On that bases, PYs will discuss how youth can contribute to promote digital society. As the use of AI continues to advance, PYs will also discuss the expanded use of AI technology and its impact on the labor market.
