The World Health Organization (WHO) of the United Nations has proclaimed that annually, each June 14, World Blood Donor Day is celebrated. The primary objective of the formalization of this day is to promote universal access to safe blood through blood donation, voluntary and unpaid.



Each year, many countries join this celebration, through local and national events, promoting new initiatives and many activities in order to ensure the healthy blood supplies.

SWYAA Perú could not sit with folded arms. This year, it encouraged its members to join the noble cause, and taking advantage of the visit of Aaron Gordon (SWY27, United Kingdom), and aiming Homestay + 1, members' blood donation was conducted.

We visited the blood bank of the National Institute of Neoplastic Diseases in Lima, which particularly treats patients of all ages suffering from cancer and illnesses associated with this disease. This initiative was made for the first time, desiring to establish a precedent for future years, so that is instituted as a habit to donate as often as possible, blood transfusions and blood products help to save millions of lives each year, increase life expectancy and quality of life of patients with life-threatening conditions, and support complex medical and surgical procedures. They also play a key role in maternal and child care, natural disasters and man-made disasters caused by humans. Each year many lives are lost due to lack of blood units. SWYAA is aware of this problem and want to remind the world that we can all help save lives.

Writing Textbooks for Japanese Universities

Passing the torch on to future SWYers. Since serving as advisor for the education discussion course on SWY19, I have settled back into my life as an English teacher in Japan. My side project in recent years has been writing textbooks for use in English classes at Japanese universities. An important lesson I learned in multicultural environments like the SWY program is that communicating proficiently in English requires not only linguistic knowledge, but also cross-cultural awareness. So, when writing textbooks I have carefully considered the best ways to integrate language and culture teaching.

For my first textbook, I focused on helping Japanese students improve their ability to explain Japanese culture in English. I was lucky to team up with Alice Gordenker, a journalist for The Japan Times. We modified articles from Alice's column, in which she investigates aspects of daily life in Japan which non-Japanese find surprising. The result was our first textbook, Surprising Japan, published in 2012. Through this textbook, students get the opportunity to explore unique aspects of Japanese culture which they had probably taken for granted, such as why some Japanese coins have holes in them and why Japanese manhole cover designs are a big hit with foreign visitors. This year, we published Working in Japan, which features video interviews with long-term foreign residents of Japan. This textbook helps Japanese students develop an awareness of world English, as using English often means communicating with fellow non-native speakers. Students can also listen to a variety of stories about cultural differences. Finally, they can learn more about the important contributions to Japanese society being made by residents from a great range of countries.

Unfortunately, it has been several years since I have stepped aboard the Nippon Maru. Through teaching English and culture in universities in Japan, however, it is my hope that I can pass the torch on to some of my students to be future SWY participants!



Something called the 'internet' would keep us connected now and in the future...that was the first time 20 years ago on the Nippon Maru that I heard of this "new technology." As you can guess, at that time not many of us had the chance to start using it until much later on by which time many of us had lost in touch.

10 years later, email had spread and many of us started to reunite, but not to the level of 20 years later! Now on Facebook, SWY7 group has over 140 members! It is so wonderful to catch up with those familiar but matured faces.

Our 20th anniversary on Facebook started on the day the program begun exactly 20 years ago. Many photos and memories uploaded from all over the world for two months. Wow, there are so many things I had forgotten about but memories started coming back just like it had happened yesterday...It was so lovely to know that we are still connecting with "Spirit of WA" as well as teaching of "Suspend your judgement" which was from the Director Matsuo's speech on board.

On March 14 2015, 55 of us joined together for a reunion party in Tokyo. About 10 had participated via internet on video conference and some watched us live on video streaming from overseas! Each members' one minute speech on "How did SWY experience affected your life?" was good fun. Watching video, Dancing "Macarena," Singing original theme song and the Director Matsuo's speech, silence for those who had passed away...4 hours was well used and the time went by so quickly. As half of us stayed at the National Olympics Memorial Youth Center including our big boss (Oyabun), the Administrator Matsuda, afterwards, the party went on through the night just like 20 years ago! 



Excerpt from "The Fiji Times," August 15, 2015

45 young people from 14 countries across the world including Fiji will be part of a four-day program during the 9th Global Assembly of the SWYAA in Nadi this week. The program also includes institutional visits, cultural exchange with youth groups in selected villages and a day cruise. The participants were welcomed by Youth Minister Laisenia Tuitubou in Nadi yesterday and he also commended the community contribution of the SWYAA Fiji namely the cyclone relief assistance provided to students and families in the Western Division, distribution of stationery packs, food rations and mangrove planting in Levuka.
