"SWY Unite" Organized by Mexican delegation: Connecting, Collaborating, and Celebrating Together

On March 17, 2023, the members of SWY 34 launched the Discord server "SWY Unite," an initiative created to strengthen the bonds within the SWY community. The platform was conceived to stay connected, facilitate the organization and participation in local and international events, and provide a space for sharing experiences, tips, job opportunities, and even elements of entertainment such as food, memes, etc.

To date, "SWY Unite" boasts 168 members, and although simultaneous participation varies, the server remains a constant meeting point. It hosts 25 channels dedicated to different interests and activities, such as channels for news, movie and series recommendations, wellness tips, and event streaming among others.

Over 20 events have been conducted through this platform, including welcome parties for international users, trivia nights, "Drinks and Draw" sessions, weekly movie and series watch parties, as well as the celebration and commemorative workshop for the Day of the Dead. An important aspect of "SWY Unite" is the freedom it offers to ex-PYs to create and promote their own events. This has allowed for a variety of activities, many of which have not been directly organized by the server creators but have been facilitated by the platform's versatility. In summary, "SWY Unite" has evolved into a dynamic and enriching space that reflects the spirit and diversity of the SWY community, fostering connection and mutual support among its members through various activities and gatherings.

SWY34 Post-Program Activity: Empowering Peruvian Local Youth

The SWY34 Peruvian Delegation organized a Post-Program Activity to promote cooperation, leadership and empathy among 25 high school students from low-income backgrounds in Barrios Altos District, Lima, Peru.

The activity promoted the SWY values such as 1) To empower local youth, 2) To promote cooperation, leadership, and empathy, 3) To strengthen skills and knowledge and 4) To change perspectives on academic and professional opportunities.

The first session focused on self-knowledge, self-esteem and promoting the SWY program. The second session focused on employability, covering CV writing and interview skills. More than 1,000 pilgrims participated in this ceremony, and 4 members of the alumni (DDS Kelum Dasanayaka, Lakmal Weeramanthri, Lahiru Mihiran and Vijitha Suranga, SWY28) helped to provide dinner and lunch to the devotees who came as pilgrims to the top of Sri Pada. Additionally, His Excellency the former President of Sri Lanka, Hon. Gotabaya Rajapaksa, and the former Defense Secretary sent their warm wishes and support to the ceremony.

SWYAA USA joined JCYC's 13th Annual SF Aloha Run for Hope

The SWYAA USA formed a team of alumni and friends to participate in the Japanese Community Youth Council (JCYC)'s 13th Annual SF Aloha Run for Hope. This activity was a fundraiser for the JCYC, whose mission is to cultivate and enrich the lives of children and youth from diverse, multicultural communities throughout San Francisco and beyond.

The SWYAA USA team had seven participants and seven supporters who ran or walked a 5km or 10km and raised funds through sponsorships. Registration fees came to almost \$400 for JCYC, and those who participated raised an additional \$446.10 in sponsorships.

Proceeds benefitted JCYC scholarship programs, which provide scholarships for low-income, first-generation college students. A portion of proceeds were also donated to the Hawaii People's Fund: Maui Aloha the People's Response, which provided immediate on the ground support to organizations that provide relief efforts to those affected by the wildfire in Maui.

Prominent Ex-PYs

Cross-Cultural Understanding Activity for High School Students (Naiara Martins, Brazil)

Experiencing different cultures



For four months, the ex-PY, Naiara Martins, a Portuguese language teacher for High School at Colégio do Sol, along with teachers in literature, mathematics, history, English, Spanish, physics, and sociology fields, organized a multicultural activity

involving approximately 130 students at Colégio do Sol, a small private school in the Federal District. The objective of the activity was to conduct an in-depth study of socio-cultural, linguistic, and historical aspects of four countries—Australia, Bahrain, Japan, and Mexico—through a cross-sectional examination of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) discussed in the SWY34. With the support of SWY 34 ex-participants TJ Morley-Buchanan (Australia), Yousif Alshams (Bahrain), Yurina Nakatsu (Japan), Kevin Alejandro (Mexico), who sent videos highlighting interesting facts about their nations in English, high school students were challenged to produce official documents regarding their countries' stances on the SDGs, newspapers covering socio-cultural aspects, and creative videos discussing literature from each country.

In the end, students participated in a debate where they were tasked with reaching diplomatic agreements on SDGs-related topics (SDG 4 and 17), using clothing and accessories that represented the countries involved. For the SWYAA Brazil, Naiara Martins' activity is a beautiful translation of how to maintain and develop the SWY spirit across different generations, even among individuals who have not participated in the program, such as children and teenagers.

Award-Winning Educator and Architect (Henry Tsang, Canada)

Dr. Henry Tsang is an award-winning Canadian educator and architect. He is an associate professor of architecture at Athabasca University and principal of Henry Tsang Architect, based in Calgary, Alberta.

Henry sailed onboard the Nippon Maru on SWY29 in 2017 as the National Leader of the Canadian delegation. His ties to Japan, however, date back to 2002 as the recipient of a MEXT Research Student Scholarship, with which he completed his doctoral studies at the University of Tokyo.

After graduation, he worked as an architect for the Japanese company Nihon Sekkei Inc. until 2012, during which time he collaborated closely with the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) on numerous official development assistance (ODA) projects worldwide. Influenced by his experience in Japan, Henry's designs and teachings today bridge Japanese and Canadian cultures. One of his most recent projects includes a new Calgary Japanese Community Centre design.

Henry is the recipient of Construction Canada's Emerging Leader Award and the Canadian Architect Award of Excellence, among many other accolades. In 2023, he was inducted into the College of Fellows of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada and named 'Calgary's Asian Changemaker.' During the 2024-2025 academic year, Henry returns to Japan as a visiting professor at the University of Tokyo and Waseda University.

Ilshat found it heartwarming to see older alumni, who had recently started their adult lives, return to support the orphanage, giving back to the place that had become their home. The visit culminated in a wonderful dinner prepared by the orphanage director and the children, followed by a lively dance session.

Empowering Tongan Youth through Teaching Dance (Viliami Taufa, Tonga)

Viliami Taufa from SWY 29 started a dance academy for youth in 2018, known as Silapeluua Academi Dance Group, and teaches Tongan traditional dances and Polynesian dances to young people.

After joining SWY29, he came back to Tonga with the mindset SWY created in him and saw how Tongan youth suffered from unemployment and committed crimes. So he started a dance academy with 5 boys and 8 girls from his province to teach them Tongan traditional dances, singing and piano lessons. Now the academy consists 107 students of different ages from 4 to 30 years old, not only from his province but from all over Tonga.

He says "I believe this academy strengthen the youth of Tonga to embrace our culture and to make use of their time and help them have a sense of belonging, to achieve goals and learn to become leaders of their own. I'd like to help the youth of my country to open their mind and see the beauty in themselves."

They had to pass through pitching and they had a final pitch and had to answer questions before teams were selected for the finals. She struggled with public speaking and even the possibility of this made her incredibly nervous. Also she had to work very closely with people for an intense period meant there were some conflicts. However she said "All of these things took me outside of my comfort zone."
