Chapter 5

The 50th Year of ASEAN-Japan Friendship and Cooperation

Special Invitation Program

The year 2023 marks the 50th commemorative year of ASEAN-Japan relations. ASEAN-Japan relations have made remarkable progress since 1973. To commemorate this occasion, the Cabinet Office invited the representatives of governments and SSEAYP alumni associations to Japan to express gratitude to all governments and concerned parties and to ask for further cooperation in the future.
